Dear Parishioners,

At Christmas we light a candle to show the way. It is an ancient Irish custom, a sign of a Christmas home, a safe house for the priest in troubled times. A sign of hope in sorrow, in bereavement, in separation, in loneliness. A sign of welcome to the stranger, to the immigrant; welcome home from hospital; welcome to the peacemaker and even if some thru death or distance won't be home for Christmas – a penny candle will be lit to renew a flame of love.

Barbara Streisand's dramatic act of lighting a candle all those years ago, at the beginning of her last concert, still remains with me as significant. She dedicated it to the many wise and good people whose lives had been needlessly and violently cut short; leader figures, lights in darkness. It was an inspirational gesture, a kind of gentle rage against the dying of the light. But more than that, it was a kindling of hope, a birth of new light and a looking to the source of light.

Christmas is the celebration of the birth of light. We were afraid of the dark, but it need not be so any longer for Christ's coming has shattered all kinds of darkness. That's what Christmas celebrates. So if we rage against the dying of the Light, we do so with a confidence that ours is an everlasting light.

Lighting the Christmas candle is no stage act. Christ has come to stay, so dot the hills and valleys with the flickering flame of hope. For now He shines through the vulnerable flesh of a helpless child in a manger in Bethlehem. This Christmas this child is born afresh, a light in the darkness of our times. Once again Jesus is born into the messiness of our world. The good news is that Christ comes to illuminate that darkness. Christ is the torch. He is the love, a shining light, to light our way.

We too are called to be beams of light. This past year, you the people of God have been a light in the midst of the darkness of the clergy abuse which descended upon the Church, by your fidelity to prayerful practice of your faith. Your response to our offertory increase "ask" last fall was quite remarkable (magnificent). God Bless you for continuing to give in these challenging times.

Parents and grandparents at the school make big sacrifices for Catholic education. Modern scientific study tells us the greatest environment for the formation of your children is not 6th thru 12th grade but Pre-K thru 8th grade. You are giving your children the greatest opportunity. Our new preschool, we are happy to say, has an enrollment of 46 students – a light in our time. I commend the parents and grandparents of our faith formation students, who faithfully bring their children to classes and Mass each Sunday. There is no substitute for parents modeling the reception of the sacraments for their children.

I wish to remind you that the greatest place to make preparation for Christmas is the human heart, God so loved the world. Do make space in your calendar to bring the whole family for the Advent Penance Service on Monday, December 17, 2018 at 7:00pm. Reconciliation with God and each other frees us to give the very best in love because we shed selfishness and prepare the way for the birth of Jesus in our hearts.

We invite you and your family to join us in the Christmas liturgies. May the Christ of Christmas bless you and your family with joy & love.

From the desk of Deacon Ron

Advent by definition is a time of preparation in anticipation of an event or a person. For the Christian it is a period of time in preparation of Christ. Our tendency is to focus on an event that has happened, yet true Advent is spent in preparation of an event not yet here. If we have been paying attention to the daily reading of our liturgical calendar, the focus is on the heavenly realm and the second coming of Jesus. As this letter is being written, the Church just celebrated the feast of Christ the King. This feast always challenges me to answer the question, Is Jesus my King? Is Jesus the central focus of my life in all that I do? If not, what is? What or who are the focal points of my life? Where is my life headed and how am I getting there? If Jesus is not the hub of my journey through this life, what or who is?

If Christ Jesus is truly the central figure of my Christian faith it calls me to be in anticipation of His coming again. Will I be ready? Will I recognize Him or will I miss Him as happened to many at the first coming? The Church is here to help us recognize Him in our daily lives. It is this very fact that I have found strength in my faith. I know that God is guiding the Church. If it were not it would not have not lasted over 2,000 years. We have been trying to destroy the Church from within through division, corruption, deceit, abuse..... for about that long. Any other organization would have folded had it not been held together by divine mortar. Our Advent should be doing the things that make Him present to ourselves and to others so we will recognize him in His coming.

Recently at two of our Sunday Masses, during the homily, 10 parishioners at each Mass were asked to come forward to accept a challenge. Each of the 20 was given a \$10 bill, not of the Church's money. They were asked as a condition upon receiving the gift to use the \$10 to give it away to another. They were asked to first take time to pray and ask Jesus to guide them in the Spirit and place on their hearts how He would direct them to share this gift. They were also asked to be aware of what stirred in their hearts as they sought the Spirits direction both the struggle and joy of discernment. They were also asked to write a testimony of their experience to share with the community.

As of the writing of this letter 12 of the 20 have written to share their story. These stories have been placed on our parish website for you to read. These stories are not there to edify the deeds of these individuals. They are to witness to you the joy that awaits each of us when we put aside our inward vision and in the spirit of intent and mission look outward to see opportunities to be the hands of Jesus to others and to see Christ in others. For it is in giving to the least of these that we have given to Jesus. It is this kind of selflessness that we will recognize Him in the breaking of the bread.

Prepare the way of the Lord this Advent and make it part of your life yearlong and in this you will know the true blessings of Christmas!






