Dear Parishioners,

I take this opportunity to invite you and your family to join us in faith and worship during the Sacred Liturgies of Holy week. Here at Saint Gregory the Great the nature of our ritual celebration of the Paschal Mystery bears unique characteristics of parish tradition.

The Holy Thursday Liturgy and the Institution of the Eucharist One of our beloved traditions is the washing of feet, which involves all parishioners, young and old, in full active participation. "Do this in remembrance of me" (Luke 22:19), Jesus is saying to us that when you do this, remember me. This is Jesus being there for us, so we can be there for Him. In the gospels Jesus tells Peter to Shepherd his flock by being of cornerstone of our faith,' service to others. At the end of the Last Supper, He models that crucified between two service and washes his disciple's feet as if to say, 'what I have done, so you must also do'. As He is the Bread of Life who nourishes us with His Real Presence, we must be washers of feet. In essence, He is saying He will always be there for us, so that we can be there for each other. This is all about Eucharistic service and a love so profound you can almost taste

Good Friday of the Lord's **Passion**

After the Last Supper, Jesus goes tomb-like church of great with the disciples to the garden of Gethsemane, an oil press in the garden of olives, to pray...and the passion begins. Peter, James, and John fall asleep; they cannot wait even one hour with Him. Judas betrays Jesus with a kiss and the through the Holy Spirit become

Good Friday liturgy, the Gospel of John recounts the passion, followed by the oldest prayers of intercessions in which we pray for the Jewish people and their growth in faith. We must all take responsibility for Jesus' death. In another unique tradition here at Saint Gregory the Great, we venerate the cross by passing it over the heads of the congregation. A very moving experience indeed! Jesus carried the cross bar (the horizontal portion of the cross) to Golgotha. Golgotha was an old stone quarry used to build the temple walls. The rock left behind was full of cracks and looked like a skull. The vertical piece of the cross was placed between these cracks. "The stone which the builders rejected has become the (1 Peter 2:7). There Jesus was criminals: a bad man and a bad thief who had been caught. (We recall his birth in Bethlehem when he was between the shepherds; always with the poor and the lowly.) Ultimately, Jesus was laid in the tomb by Joseph of Arimathea. Good Friday is called good because on Easter morning Jesus rose from the dead.

Holy Saturday Night: The Easter Vigil

On Holy Saturday we enter a absence, similar to how it feels to see the empty chair of a departed loved one. We feel it. As the evening progresses, we experience fire and light along with the splashing waters of chaos, which

soldiers arrest Him. During the the splashing waters of baptism. Alleluia, Christ is Risen! Just as our own fire is lit by Joe Duffy, we recall St. Patrick who lit the Paschal Fire on the hill of Slane in Ireland. The Druid Priest said, 'Unless we quench that fire tonight, it will never be extinguished."...<u>Nor was it</u>. The fire of our faith burns brightly.

> In our RCIA Candidates and Elect, we rejoice in the Baptismal celebration of new life, reception into full communion with the church, and in Confirmation. We also renew our own Baptismal promises, at all the Easter Masses, to be witnesses of the resurrection.

Let me express deep gratitude to God for creating signs of new life among us, and gratitude to you for your sacrificial response to our offertory increase campaign and the Annual Catholic Appeal. I also have deep gratitude for the new life of our new preschool and thank God for the return of Deacon Ron and Rebecca Krawczak. Please continue your prayers for Stephanie Lower in recuperation.

In closing, I invite you to experience God's loving mercy & unconditional love in the Lenten Penance Service on Monday, March 19th at 7:00pm in preparation for Easter. We will have 18 priests to hear your confessions.

May the Grace of the Risen Lord bring new life to each and every family this Easter!

From the Desk of Deacon Ron

Easter 2018

Here we are, another Easter! What is Easter to us? For some it is special Sunday (known as Fun-day for many) celebrating niceties i.e. colorful baskets filled with decorated eggs, chocolate bunnies and marshmallow chicks. On the surface there is a warm fuzziness about Easter like frosting on a cake. Yet, like a cake there is more to it than the frosting. What is the substance of Easter? Some may say it comes out of suffering and penance, prayer, fasting and alms giving. While these are the things that lead to resurrection it is so much more. It is personal, it is intimate, it must be felt.

I was talking with one of my daughters-in-law recently who is days away from giving birth to their second child. I was asking about her discomfort at times and the hardships of the final days of pregnancy. Then I asked her about that moment when the baby is born, when labor is done and the final push has past, what is it like to hold that child for the first time? What is that moment like, to cuddle this new life that just moments before was part of you? Her reply was a look, an expression that came over her whole body. It took her from where we were to that moment that only a mother can know. There were no words needed, nor are there words that can describe what could only be felt; that is RESURRECTION, that is EASTER!

Too often we get caught up in doing religious practices. Like pregnancy it is not something one does, it is something one experiences, something that becomes part of you. Jesus, speaking of His return did not say, when the Son of Man comes will he find religion on earth. Jesus said, "When the Son of Man comes will he find faith on earth?" (Lk 18:8). Please do not misunderstand me, our religious practice is important but it is a discipline to help develop a deeper faith. It is what sustains us at times. But, when the day of our meeting Jesus face to face comes, we will not be asked how many times we went to Mass, how many rosaries did we say nor did we pray 10,000 memorares like steps to a Fitbit. At the final judgment Jesus will say welcome to my Father's kingdom, "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me." (Mt 25:35-36). This is not something that we must go out of our way to seek out. These opportunities surround us daily, in our families, at work, in school. Wherever we are there is a need to see Christ and to serve Him. Feed someone with an act of kindness, quench the thirst of someone who needs affirmation, cloth the one who has been stripped of their self-worth, bind the wounds of those who have been cut deeply by the words of others and visit those who suffer the imprisonment of depression or addiction.

If the practice of our faith does not include actual service to others it is for not. It is in the service of others that we see and touch the risen Lord. Like the embrace of a new mother, Christ will embrace us in these moments of resurrection. May your Easter season bring about the joy of new birth in Christ.

Did you know...The first day of preschool was on Monday, February 26. Our excited little friends and their parents eagerly waited for the doors to open and immediately felt right at home.






