

### A Message from Fr. Nick

Dear Parishioners,

The journey towards Christmas is one we make at the darkest time of the year. Days are short and the evenings are filled with shadows. We celebrate the birth of our Savior - the light of the world, the light that shines in the darkness.

The candle we light in our homes and Churches at Christmas time reminds us also that we are called to shine the light of Christ in the world. Our community has been able to shine the light of Christ through Offertory Renewal in support of our Mission toward young adult outreach and the formation of small groups; building community by investing in each other.

Earlier this year, Cardinal Newman was canonized. One of his most important works was a poem called "The Pillar and the Cloud", better known as the hymn 'Lead Kindly Light'. It contains the powerful imagery of light, including the lines:

"Lead kindly light, amidst the encircling gloom, Lead thou me on! The night is dark and I am far from home, Lead thou me on!"

At the canonization Mass on October 13th, Pope Francis called on us all to be "kindly lights" in the darkness.

When we light our Christmas candle, let's consider where we can be the light of Christ. When we place a lit candle in our windows, as is the tradition for Christmas eve and Christmas day, do we live out the hospitality it represents? Do we shine the light of love in our families; the light of compassion and kindness for the poor and hurting? How do we offer the light of hope to the less fortunate? As Christians, we make the hearts of non-believers burn within them if we can convey the truth that our religion is not a moral code to keep us in order, but a vibrant way of life that radiates joy.

"The Christian has a deep, silent, hidden peace, which the world sees not.... The Christian is cheerful, easy, kind, gentle, courteous, candid, unassuming, has no pretense..." Saint John Henry Newman

To help surface all those qualities in our lives, we have the parish Advent Penance Service on Monday, December 16th at 7:00pm. I encourage you to prepare for His coming by participating in this healing Sacrament. If you have wandered away from the Catholic Faith, this is a great way to come home for Christmas.

May the Christ child bring home tender love to your family with Christmas blessings in abundance. And may your great generosity in Christ to this community bring its own rewards.

### From the Desk of Deacon Ron

Greetings to the Church of St. Gregory the Great, Peace and joy be your's in Christ! I've always wanted to start a letter to you as if it was Paul writing to one of the early Churches. While I am no St. Paul or a saint for that matter, you are Christ's Church and I address you as such.

It is just before Thanksgiving that I am writing to you. With the Advent and Christmas seasons rapidly approaching and with the onslaught of 50 degree weather, which is subfreezing to many San Diegans (LOL), there is a mood change. Our thoughts turn to our relationship as family and friends. There is a desire to reconnect with those that have meaning in our life that we don't seem to make time for during the year. We also tend to reflect on all the things that went on in our life this past year and wonder what it's all about.

Recently my wife and I were having dinner with friends at their house. Before and during dinner, we talked about many things like faith, family, travel, food, wine, of course, and the like. Toward the end of dinner, the husband of the couple asked if he could ask a question: "What is life all about?" He went on, "Is it about working most of your life, amassing things, traveling? Is there more to life than waking each day, eating, working and sleeping, just to get up the next day and start it all over again?"

I have been pondering this for weeks in prayer and in discussions. My conclusion to what life is all about; it's about loving relationships. Sounds too simplistic I know. Here is my premise: when each person is conceived, the human and divine work together. As we share a small piece of us, as male and female, to create new life, God also shares a small piece of God's self, which we call a soul. It is this Trinitarian relationship that brings about the human being. This three-in-one relationship sets within us a lifelong desire and hunger for loving relationships. The longing of that little piece of God within us, to be reunited with the fullness from which it came, is what life is about. All of our desires, longings, hopes and dreams, are driven by the God in us being attracted to the source from which it was separated. Out of this quest for completeness also comes pain and suffering, when we try to fulfill the longing for God with other things. The divine life that dwells within us is fed or starved by how, and with what, we feed it. "Unless I have love I have nothing" (ICor. 13:2). To find the meaning of life, I must feed that part of God that is in me. It is like the parable of the coins in Mt. 25: 14-30: please dust off your bible and take the time to read this passage. Now ask yourself, am I increasing that which is God within me?

The soul is fed by first giving thanks to the source of life and then passing that on to others. It's a process. There is wisdom in our seasonal celebrations. First, we give thanks to God for all that we have and through gratitude we develop a desire to be gift to others, and then, to celebrate the relationship that has been fed and has new life. This is Thanksgiving, Advent and Christmas seasons.

The things we give for Christmas should represent the gift of self and not the thing. There are those who are in need of love all around us, the homeless, those in the hospital hanging onto life and their families. There are those who are distracted from the meaning of love by cancer, illness and loneliness. There are those of us who have had the recent loss of a loved one. The fact remains that until we rest in God we will always feel a lacking in this life. St Augustine once said, "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it finds its rest in you."

May we all be blessed with the desire to feed the soul within us, in order to feed the soul of others, to at long last be in the fullness of the meaning of life, the God who created us.


## **Knights of Columbus**


